President's Message



Happy New Year! I hope that 2013 will bring you success and happiness in all your endeavors.

Thank you for approving the Burleith

Citizens Association's slate of 2013 officers. I look forward to working with all the dedicated members of the BCA Board.

As president, I have big shoes to fill and will surely need your support and advice as I try to build on Lenore Rubino's and Chris Clements' achievements. Due to extraordinarily hard work on the zoning hearings by dedicated residents and the neighborhoods' coalition, we accomplished great things under their leadership.

We have leaped over a 20-year old hurdle with Georgetown University, which, I believe, is now cooperating with its neighbors as equal partners through the **Georgetown Community Partnership**. The GCP, which is made up of elected leaders of the Advisory Neighborhood Commission, presidents of the neighborhood citizens associations (Burleith, Georgetown, and Foxhall), senior university leaders, students, and faculty, will meet on January 26. This partnership oversees five working groups on safety and student life, metrics and data, environment and landlord issue, transportation and parking, and communication and engagement. Members of the Burleith

community sit on each of these committees, which will also meet this month. Recently, a few residents and members of the board met with Lauralyn Lee, the new GU associate vice president for community engagement and strategic initiatives; Don Edwards, who serves as facilitator for GU/community discussions; and Michael Akin, who is studying off-campus functions and will make recommendations for ways to improve them.

We have had some success at quelling **noise** involving GU student houses, and we continue to work on this issue within the GCP. We are having less success at reducing young professionals' disorderly conduct, but we are trying to address that problem more effectively. I thank all of you who have advised us of noise problems, which Ross Schipper faithfully enters into a log that serves as the basis for weekly discussions on safety matters.

On December 11, Gail Juppenlatz and I attended the **zoning public outreach meeting** for Ward 2 residents. (Please see article on page 3.) Gail, Pat Scolaro, and I met before that session to discuss the draft regulations and prepare our questions for representatives from the Office of Planning and the Zoning Commission, which organized the meeting. Many thanks to Gail and Pat. (Please note that the BCA Board has not yet weighed in on these preliminary regulations).

In another matter of community interest, the District Department of Transportation will host a public meeting on **parking** in Burleith and Georgetown on Wednesday, January 16, at 6:30 p.m. at Hardy School. I encourage everyone who can to attend and share ideas and concerns about this important issue.

I also encourage those of you who are not currently BCA members to **join the association**. Your contributions (which cost as little as \$25 per household) and the ads in the *Bell* are the only financial resources the BCA has to help us represent our neighborhood in the best way possible. A larger membership will strengthen our standing and credibility, in addition to enhancing our financial capability. Your continued support as members, volunteers, and activity participants will help us achieve our goals on behalf of Burleith. One of those valued volunteers is Karen Landes, who organized Santa's successful visit to Burleith families on December 16. Kudos to Karen!

I look forward very much to getting to know more of you throughout the coming year.

New Zoning Regulations for the District of Columbia

On December 11, the Office of Planning held a public outreach meeting for Ward 2 residents on proposed changes to the District of Columbia zoning regulations. The meeting was well attended by residents, who posed a number of questions about parking, sustainability, building height, corner stores, and Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs). The revision of DC Zoning Regulations is the first time these regulations have been reviewed since 1958.

A great deal has changed over the past 50+ years. As of July 2011, the DC population was approximately 618,000. Over the past decade, the number of 20-34 year olds increased by 23%, and the number of seniors grew by 187%. The average household size decreased from 3.2 to 2.11 persons, while the number of households increased by 19%. Forty-four percent of households are single-person dwellings.

While the Office of Zoning is holding public outreach meetings for other wards through January 16, and will schedule public hearings this spring, a few initial conclusions drawn from Ward 2 session are:

- 1) the parking policies do not appear to affect Burleith;
- 2) corner store policies could possibly affect our neighborhood since the new draft code would allow for limited commercial and arts activity in residential areas;
- 3) boarding houses are not permitted in Ward 2;
- 4) the limit of six unrelated people living in one house remains; and
- 5) for accessory dwelling units, "either the principal dwelling unit or accessory dwelling unit shall be occupied by the owner of the lot coterminous with the accessory dwelling." In Burleith there could be one ADU in a house by right or one in an existing garage. New construction would be by special exception.

You can find more information at www.dczoningupdate.org and www.planning.dc.gov. Subtitle D includes the most pertinent information for Burleith. You can also testify at the public hearings in the spring.

Georgetown Village Celebrates First Anniversary

One volunteer drove a member more than 2 hours to pick up the member's handicapped child so the child could come home for a visit (and then reversed the trip a week later). One member

heard that a volunteer had no plans for Thanksgiving and invited the volunteer to a family dinner. And another volunteer helped a member unpack and organize a kitchen in a new apartment, and even made a run to the Container Store for storage containers.

Volunteers were thanked for the many services they performed and received a small token of appreciation from board members Joan Kennan and Ann Satterthwaite. The program closed with the raffle of 21 "gifts" contributed by area merchants and a special drawing of a \$50 gift card for our non-member volunteers, including the high school and GU students, who cheerfully and actively participated from set up through clean up.

As our first year in operation comes to a close, we are pleased to announce that renewals for both household and individual memberships have met the goals set by the Village. RESTAURANT REVIEW: OLD EUROPE*By Corinna Lothar*

It's been around so long—almost 65 years—that one tends to overlook the restaurant next to Pearson's liquor store on Wisconsin Avenue. Since 1948, Old Europe has been serving traditional German food in a traditional German atmosphere. It's a cozy, comfortable white tablecloth restaurant. One wall is covered with landscape paintings; portraits of old men in period attire adorn the other. Above the paintings are coats of arms and large antique beer steins. The waitresses wear pretty dirndls. You could be in any old-fashioned small town restaurant in Germany, except that no one speaks German.

Old Europe's menu is typically old-style German: bratwurst, sauerbraten, sauerkraut, red cabbage, and so forth. Each season has its specialty: asparagus and ham in the spring, grilled meats in summer, Oktoberfest in autumn, and game in the winter. Portions are huge, and the dishes are tasty but on the heavy side.

We started a recent dinner with a delicious appetizer of marinated pieces of herring in a sour cream sauce with tiny matchstick-sized pieces of apple and pickle, served with a small green salad on the side. Equally good was a first course of three crisp potato pancakes served with apple sauce.

Schnitzel are house specialties. The veal scallops are served Viennese style, breaded and garnished with a lemon slice, or topped with a mushroom cream sauce. Pork or chicken can be substituted for the veal. The "jaegerschnitzel" with mushrooms in a cream sauce is a good choice. The accompanying carrots have a lovely buttery flavor, but the spaetzle—those tiny bits

of pasta-like dough—are overcooked. Sauerbraten is braised so as to be fork tender, but lacks the acidic pungency of a good marinade. The red cabbage accompanying the beef is excellent, with a hint of wine and apple.

Bratwurst, trout and salmon, Hungarian goulasch, smoked pork loin and sirloin steaks, as well as vegetarian dishes, round out the main course menu. Currently, Old Europe is featuring its game season with such specialties as venison sausage, pork liver pate, venison stew, wild boar stew, and half a roasted duckling. Most of the dishes are available at lunch.

Apple strudel is house made. Wines by the glass are good and at \$6 each very reasonable. There is a full wine list and, of course, an ample supply of beer.

Thursday through Sunday, dinner is accompanied by live piano music, while Wednesday is polka night. The restaurant is closed on Monday.

Ring in the new, but let's not forget Old Europe, especially when asparagus season arrives. Happy New Year!

George J. Viksnins

George Viksnins, age 75, passed away on December 16. A resident of 3731 T Street with his wife, Mara, since 1964, Professor Viksnins retired as a professor of economics at Georgetown University, where he served on the faculty for nearly five decades. As a teacher, he was famous for his ability to engage young people. Through stories, examples, and his encyclopedic knowledge of economic theory, he made his subject come alive for generations of students.

According to a eulogy delivered at his memorial service, in 1944 7-year-old George and his family were on the last train out of Latvia to join the refugees of Europe. After years of moving with his family from one displaced persons camp to another, 13 in all, he arrived in America in 1950. From that early turmoil, he built a life of extraordinary achievement, of family, of pride in his native land.

During his distinguished career, Professor Viksnins was a program economist for the USAID mission in Bangkok, visiting professor at the University of California (Irvine), and a consultant to the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve

System, The World Bank, and the International Monetary Fund. He was an advisor to his native Latvia after the fall of communism and is credited with playing an important role in the design of the Latvian monetary system. He earned degrees in economics from Georgetown University (PhD), the University of Pennsylvania (MA), and Temple University (BA).

In addition to regular poker games with his colleagues, his favorite leisure activities included playing tennis, watching the Redskins, and making his world-famous sauerkraut. "Uncle George" enjoyed attending Burleith's annual summer picnic, where he was proud to grill hamburgers and hot dogs for neighbors and friends.

According to his family, "He lived long enough to conclude his academic work on his own terms, to see his native land free and prosperous, and know his beloved grandchildren. In that way, and so many others, he lived a happy and complete life." In addition to his wife, Professor Viksnins is survived by children Helen, Ingrid, Peter, and Brigit, and seven grandchildren.
