## President's Message



**Ed Solomon**, our neighbor and BCA board member has resigned from his position as Chair of the Advisory Neighborhood Commission. Ed

will now assume the position of treasurer of the ANC and will be heading the ANC safety committee. Georgetown neighbor Ron Lewis steps into the role of Chair. I've had the privilege of working with both Ed and Ron, two extraordinary individuals who devote hours of time and effort on our behalf. Many thanks to both of them for their hard work

I recently attended an **ANC safety meeting** with MPD acting Cdr. Matthew Klein and Sgt. Aisha Hackley. (Sgt. Hackley will be working with Lt. Milam, who is in a short-term training program.) In December, Lt. Milam dedicated two officers to monitor the noise levels in Burleith and West Georgetown. MPD is now issuing a citation called "61D" to anyone who exhibits **disorderly conduct**, especially from houses that are continually violating the noise ordinance. A **61D** will show up as an arrest on the recipients record. While the \$35 fine accompanying the 61D is minimal, the arrest record is not and should be taken very seriously.

You may have noticed some **fire hydrants** in Burleith with service rings on them. Many have been this way for quite a few months. I attended February's ANC meeting where the commission grilled DC's Water and Sewer Authority, asking them to explain why 59 out of 200 fire hydrants in Georgetown have not been repaired. The WASA representative

had no acceptable explanation. The ANC has asked for a list of fire hydrants needing repair, and a schedule of what is going to be done and when. I asked ANC Executive Director Melanie Gisler to make sure that Burleith's fire hydrants are included.

I was approached by two Glover Park residents who are interested in having the Burleith and Glover Park community sponsor a **farmer's market** in the Hardy School parking lot on Saturday mornings. They have done quite a bit of research and appear to be developing a sound plan, which we will publish in the next newsletter. The community would surely benefit from having the farmer's market. The BCA board will review this and keep the community informed in the next newsletter and on the Burleith Yahoo Group. The ANC has given provisional support for the farmer's market.

**Safeway** will soon begin their renovation work. Representatives from the grocery store spoke about the plan to have the pharmacy relocated to one of the stores behind Einstein Bagels during the renovation. In March, utility work will begin while the store still remains open for business. The store is tentatively set to close on April 1st of this year. The renovation should last for about a year, pending approval of certain permits.

## INAUGURATION WEEK EXPERIENCES

Regardless of one's political persuasion, the inauguration of a new president is an important event -- especially this one, with almost 2 million people coming to our city to see the inauguration of Barack Obama, the first African-American president of the United States

**"Day of Service" on MLK Holiday.** One of the highlights for us was volunteering at RFK Stadium to assemble "care packages" to send to our troops. By scheduling groups of volunteers each hour of the day, over 10,000 people assembled 85,000 care packages for US armed services personnel serving overseas. The packages contained sundry items such as toothpaste, chewing gum, and hand lotion, all donated by Target Stores. According to the organizers, even more appreciated by the troops are thank you letters written by the volunteers included with the packets.

Upon entering RFK, groups of about 60 volunteers were assembled in the "stands" where the procedures for assembling the packets were explained. To overcome the cold and to channel our enthusiasm, a group leader led each cohort of volunteers in a few cheers, "Yes we can...." A wonderful feeling of solidarity and service was shared by volunteers of all races—young and old, men

and women, rich and poor. Similar events are scheduled each year and are widely publicized.

**American Indian Powwow & Inaugural Ball.** Both the powwow (Monday) and the ball (Tuesday) were held at the Hyatt Regency-Crystal City. While it's not widely known, thousands of American Indians and Alaska Natives reside in the Washington area working at federal agencies (e.g., Bureau of Indian Affairs, Indian Health Service, and "Indian desks" in most federal departments), and at Indian organizations like the National Congress of American Indians and the National Indian Education Association. At presidential inaugurations (and other important occasions), Indians and Alaska Natives from all over the country join their friends, relatives, and colleagues in the DC metro area and attend a powwow and the Indian inaugural ball.

For me, the highlight of the powwow was the presentation of colors and the veterans honor song and honor dance. In addition to the "Stars and Stripes," the colors presented include battle flags of units in which the participating vets have served, as well as tribal staffs and sacred objects, many of which pre-date the other colors. Most of the participants, especially those in the dances, wore traditional or "fancy dancing" regalia which might include

feathers, shells, bells, animal skins, ribbon shirts, moccasins...any and all of which may be beaded.

At the ball, tuxedos and gowns replaced the traditional regalia, and were not much different from other balls in town (cash bar, loud music, mingling, hors d'oeuvres), except that there was no appearance from the Presidential party and the participants were mostly Native Americans.

## THE JOCKEY CLUB

Remember the Jockey Club? The restaurant opened on the eve of John F. Kennedy's inauguration in 1961. For decades, it was the favorite of politicians, movie stars and Important People in Washington. But the owners changed hands and the restaurant closed. Now the Jockey Club is back after an absence of seven years in its old spot in the Fairfax Hotel on Massachusetts Avenue at 21st Street NW, with Richard McCreadie the new Glaswegian executive chef and the former maitre d'hotel, Martin Garbisu, back at the door.

The restored Jockey Club is not exactly the same as it was, but close enough to evoke nostalgic memories. The service is impeccable; the wine list extensive and excellent; and the cuisine a combination of past and present. The only complaint, and it's a minor one, is that the cooking is too cautious; some of the dishes need spicing up.

The restaurant's classic appetizers include beef tartar, shrimp cocktail, the Jockey Club signature lump crab cake and a perfect Caesar salad, tangy and tasty, prepared tableside. Potato gnocchi with wild mushrooms, a tuna tartar and pan seared foie gras are new starters. The menu offers a rich selection of fish and meat: roasted cod loin, steamed lobster tail, roasted chicken breast with

wild mushroom polenta, herb crusted lamb chops, grilled steak and potatoes, and veal sweetbreads with asparagus and truffle butter. The Dover sole, a longtime signature, is as delicious as ever. It's sautéed in butter and deboned tableside.

Who can resist a soufflé for dessert - chocolate, strawberry, vanilla or Grand Marnier. Crème brulee, crepes Suzette or strawberries Romanoff (with whipped cream and a Grand Marnier sabayon) are sweet temptations.

While luncheon starters are similar to dinner, main courses vary, but Nancy Reagan's chicken salad is back.

The Fairfax Lounge, just off the lobby, is back, too, almost exactly as it was, with comfortable chairs, sofas and a back room where a pianist entertains on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays.

## KEEP BURLEITH SAFE DURING WINTER WEATHER!

With the recent snow and ice storms, the problem of icy sidewalks and the danger they represent has been raised in several forums, including the Burleith "Yahoo Group" listserve.

District law requires property owners to clear snow and ice from sidewalks, handicap ramps and steps abutting their property within the first eight daylight hours after the snow, sleet or ice stops falling. This applies to all property owners - residential, commercial, federal, and municipal. If ice cannot be cleared without damaging the sidewalk, then property owners may spread sand or salt to make the sidewalks safe. Property owners also must clear snow from the ADA-curb cuts, which are considered part of the sidewalk, and are requested to clear snow from catch basins and storm drains to prevent flooding during snow melt.

Many neighborhoods have developed lists of those willing to shovel snow for neighbors who are unable to shovel on their own, and all communities are encouraged to identify individuals who are willing to provide this service so that sidewalks are safe and passable for all.

If you have any questions or want to inform the Solid Waste Education and Enforcement Program (SWEEP) that a business is not complying with removing snow from the sidewalk, please call the enforcement office at 202-645-7190 and a SWEEP Inspector will visit the location and discuss the snow removal issue with the business owner.

Jazz concerts in the area. His other love was the Chesapeake Bay. As a young man, he had sailed his own boat and always dreamed of a 50 foot sail boat to take on the ocean.


