## Burleith Takes Shape

This aerial view of developing Burleith surrounded by fields and wooded areas shows Western High School (now Duke Ellington School of the Arts), new houses, and some pre-Shannon & Luchs construction.

Behind the school are the House of Good Shepherd and its commercial laundry. The residential facility was built in 1890 to further its founders' mission of providing "a refuge to females who have had the misfortune to lead an evil life and who wish to abandon their vicious course and to reform their lives." It closed in the 1960s, and the Washington International School now occupies the site.

## President's Message



I begin this message by thanking Linda Brooks and Ross Schipper for a highly successful **Gløgg Party** at their lovely Burleith home. Over

60 people, some with children in tow, attended, including Councilmember Jack Evans and ANC2E Chair Ron Lewis. We gained one new BCA membership and several renewals as a result of this festive winter event.

As spring approaches, we look ahead to the **spring cleanup and picnic** and will let you know the dates very soon.

The **Georgetown Community Partnership** (GCP) working groups are making progress. Many have met multiple times and are quickly gathering the necessary information to make strong recommendations on ways to improve the quality of life in the neighborhoods surrounding GU. (See David Bachner's and Janice Sims' articles on page 3.) Although hard work remains, I am hopeful about success.

As a result of the DC Nonprofit Act of 2010 and subsequently dated **BCA bylaws**, the BCA created a committee

to study our current bylaws and amend them as needed. Bonnie Hardy, Lenore Rubino, and Ed Solomon undertook this task, and the BCA Board discussed their excellent work at our February 21 meeting. A few issues remain for the board to consider following a review by an attorney. The final phase will be a vote by the BCA membership. Many thanks to Bonnie, Lenore, and Ed.

Over the past months, a number of residents from Glover Park, Burleith, and Georgetown have raised serious concerns about **traffic jams** up and down Wisconsin Avenue, as well as increased, diverted traffic into the neighborhood streets of Burleith and Glover Park. The ANC will address these problems during its March 4 meeting, at which Councilmembers Jack Evans and Mary Cheh and DDOT Director Terry Bellamy will speak to the community. I urge you to attend this meeting to share your opinions on these controversial changes to Wisconsin Avenue and their effect on our neighborhood. (See page 4 for meeting time and location.)

In an effort to address declining revenues, the BCA will undertake a **new advertising campaign** that we hope will increase our coffers. In addition to small *Bell* spotlight

articles on our advertisers, we are also considering including short videos on the advertisers for our website, packaging a business BCA membership with the purchase of ads, and alerting members via email, Twitter, and Facebook of new advertisers. We encourage you to patronize our advertisers and thank them for supporting Burleith. ## Georgetown Community Partnership (GCP) Working Group Updates

**Membership:** Both of the working groups featured here are composed of Burleith, Foxhall, and Georgetown community representatives; an ANC member; and GU administrators and students. The Safety and Student Life Working Group also has a GU faculty member. Both groups are assisted by a meeting facilitator, and GCP Steering Committee members periodically attend meetings.

### Safety and Student Life

**Background:** The DC Zoning Commission approved the amended Georgetown University Campus Plan for the period January 1, 2011, through December 31, 2017, subject to certain conditions. A number of these conditions relate to quality-of-life issues in the communities neighboring the university's main campus. Specifically, GU agreed to "commit sufficient resources (financial, personnel, intellectual capital, etc.) to [the] University's Quality of Life Initiative to support a safe community, educate students to be good neighbors, and successfully mitigate the impacts of trash, noise, and student behavior." Sections 14 through 18 in the "Joint Conditions of Approval" provide GU with detailed charges for mitigation.

Under the auspices of the GCP, which was established to insure that the joint conditions of approval are fulfilled, our working group was formed to produce recommendations aimed at implementing this initiative.

**Progress to date:** The working group has met four times so far. The first meeting, on January 23, focused on understanding the group's mandate, articulating desired outcomes, clarifying the decision-making and recommendation process, and addressing members' questions and concerns. We also agreed to continue meeting, as much as possible, for 90 minutes every Wednesday. On January 30, GU explained its present student-conduct adjudication process and programs directed at mitigating negative impacts of students on the neighborhoods surrounding the main campus.

On February 6, members of the Metropolitan Police Department and a lawyer from the DC Attorney General's office described

MPD's efforts to address student-conduct problems and shared certain of the legal and practical constraints they face in this area. Community representatives then distributed a list of draft recommendations addressing student-related problems in our neighborhoods, including stronger and consistent sanctions, better reporting, a behavioral contract for students living off-campus, and better communication with the neighborhood. On February 20, GU representatives outlined actions the university plans to take immediately in response to community and other input thus far, such as reaffirming strong sanctions and communication with parents. At our February 27 meeting, we began discussing priority areas of concern and tactics for addressing them.

### Environmental and Landlord Issues

**Background:** This group was formed to make recommendations aimed at implementing initiatives to address environmental and landlord issues in our neighborhood.

**Progress to date:** Our working group has met five times beginning last fall. Within the past two months, we've been meeting biweekly. Our presentation to the GCP Steering committee on April 27 will focus on our role, our identification of major environmental and landlord issues in our neighborhood, educating the steering committee on roles and responsibilities of residents (student and non-student) regarding household waste management, the DC government's role and its regulations, as well as landlord responsibilities in the District.

Key issues noted to date are lack of basic understanding about proper waste management by residents, mismanagement of household waste by residents (students and non-students), litter, rat harborages, lack of street tree maintenance and misuse of tree boxes, poor exterior property maintenance, and graffiti.

Our main focus will be to develop creative and sustainable solutions to address these areas in a measurable way. Stay tuned for more to come in the coming months.

### Introducing Walter Hillabrant, Recording Secretary #2

A resident of Burleith since 1973 and a "born-again" skier, Walter lives on 38th Street with his wife, Judy. He has served on the BCA board as vice-president, recording secretary, and member at large. While he maintains a part-time practice as a clinical psychologist, his focus is on research, mostly in "Indian country" (he is enrolled in the Citizen Potawatomi Tribe). Walter is the president of Support Services International, Inc.; managing director of Native American Capital, LLC; and a board member of C4 Recovery Solutions, Inc., where he coordinates the Indigenous Healers Initiative.

## ADVERTISER SPOTLIGHT: Gardens for All Seasons

*Connecting our neighbors with the businesses that support our community*

Kathy Osore of **Gardens for All Seasons** discusses how her connection to nature translates into her approach to landscaping. (See her ad on page 7 for contact information.)

**Tell us a little bit about Gardens for All Seasons and how it came to be?**

I have always loved nature and the changing seasons. I started becoming more interested in landscaping as a profession when I moved into my first house and had my own garden. I took classes at GW on landscape design and worked for a local company before branching out to do my own services through developing Gardens for All Seasons. The name stems from the wonder I feel when seeing the change in seasons, and I try to bring that into each garden that we design and maintain.

**What might new clients expect in an initial consultation?**

At the first visit, I usually like to walk around with them to see what they like or dislike about their garden: do they prefer

things trimmed or left more natural? do they like flowers or more of an evergreen look? I also like to see if they actively use the garden or mostly view things from inside, since one of my goals is to get people to go outside more.

**What are the challenges of working with small urban gardens and the DC climate?**

Gardens in the metro area reflect the diversity we have here, and we take care of any size from rooftops to wooded lots. We spend a majority of our time in DC and find that the smaller gardens present their own challenges, since they are much more intimate than suburban gardens. The changing temperatures, high humidity, and variety of soil types always keep us learning new things about how to give clients healthy gardens. As we provide services, we try to always keep in mind that we are also part of the bigger picture, as stewards of our region and our world.

## First Families of Burleith – A 1930 Snapshot

Ninety years ago, in 1923, Warren G. Harding was president of the United States, and the real estate firm Shannon & Luchs began construction of 450 row houses that would eventually constitute the majority of the homes in present-day Burleith. By June, the first completed houses were put on sale to “the buyer of moderate means, but of more than ordinary good taste” for the initial price of \$7,700.

That year marked the beginning of the Roaring Twenties, a period of unparalleled prosperity for the American economy. During this period, which ended with the October 1929 stock market “crash” that signaled the beginning of the Great Depression, the new Burleith homes received their first occupants.

What do we know of these “first families” of Burleith? The 1930 Census provides a window into these families and how they lived just after the onset of the Depression. My research started with the 55 “first families” identified in *A Short History of Burleith*, written by Edgar Farr Russell, the grandfather of current BCA member Edgar Russell III, and published in 1955 and again in 1973 by the BCA.

Using these 55 as a starting point, I found 177 Burleith families in the census records. Assuming this sample is a fair representation of Burleith in 1930, what can we conclude?

Slightly over three quarters of the families were resident homeowners, while 24% rented. For those who owned their own homes, the average purchase price was \$10,000; the average monthly rental cost was \$75.

A traditional two-parent family was the norm, although there were 27 single-parent families in the sample, and 70% of these had a female head of household. The population of Burleith in 1930 was fairly young; 73% of the households had minor children, the average number being 1.7 with an average age of 8.6 years. But this was the beginning of the Depression and not surprisingly 12% had adult children who still lived at home. Nineteen percent of the homes housed an extended family member (parent, in-law, grandparent, sibling, aunt or uncle, niece or nephew).

Many homes rented out a spare bedroom. In 1930, 11% of the homes had one or more boarders, and several had two or three.

This is the second in a series of *Burleith Bell* articles celebrating Burleith’s 90th anniversary. So far six BCA members have expressed interest in assisting in the study of Burleith’s history and will no doubt be involved in authoring future articles. Of course, some households fared better than others, and seven of the homes in this sample had full-time live-in servants.

We often think of the Burleith rowhouses as being small dwellings, but in 1930, the average occupancy was 3.6. In this sample, three of the homes had seven related occupants and one had nine (a family with seven children)! Since the original Shannon & Luchs floor plans had three bedrooms and one bathroom, one can only imagine the wait to use the bathroom in the morning!

## RESTAURANT REVIEW: Sushiko

The beautifully presented dishes are as good as ever; the wine list, including sakis, as carefully thought out. Sushiko, in Glover Park, claims to have been the first sushi bar in Washington.

The Japanese restaurant offers its customers a wide variety of dishes, ranging from sushi and sashimi (raw fish) to small dishes of, for example, shrimp with cucumber, or spinach, asparagus, and smoked salmon, to hot small plates, main courses, and soups. There are daily specials.

Our starter at a recent dinner was a full assortment of vegetable tempura—also available in half orders. Served with a tangy dipping sauce, the vegetables that evening included string beans, broccoli, sweet potatoes, and white potato slices, each crisp, hot, and not greasy. Delicious. Tempura is offered with rock shrimp and with shrimp and vegetables as well as with just vegetables.

Chicken gyoza, the little Japanese dumplings, were good, but not as delicate as the superb Chinese dumplings served at Shanghai Lounge down the street.

A main course of chicken teriyaki was excellent, the chicken strips fragrant, grilled, and served with cocktail tomatoes. Three skewers of chicken teriyaki (about half the size of the entree) can be ordered as a starter for \$6 instead of \$15.

The highlights of Sushiko are the sushi and sashimi. The fish varies from day to day. We tried the fatty salmon sashimi. The two slices,

accompanied by Japanese mustard and pickled ginger, could not have been fresher or more delicious. The same was true of tuna and avocado maki (sushi rolled in seaweed). Sashimi dishes at Sushiko include tuna tartare, flounder carpaccio, and salmon sevicehe, as well as the traditional sashimi, including assortments of four to eight varieties of fish.

Sushiko is unpretentious and simple. In the back of the restaurant is a large sushi bar, behind which two chefs work busily. There are only a few tables downstairs, but there is also an upstairs, which, unlike in many restaurants, is not a form of Siberia.

Our only complaint was that service tends to be slow. Sushiko sees art and food as the fundamentals of Japanese cuisine. Both are well met here.
