

President's Message



Hopefully when all of you receive this edition of the *Burleith Bell*, the weather will have improved and the crocuses will be blooming. But, while the snow lingers I would like to remind everyone of their obligation to **shovel the sidewalks** adjacent to their property (even if you are a renter) within 24 hours of a snowfall. Seniors and folks with disabilities are exempted from this requirement. DC Public Schools are responsible for sidewalks adjacent to their properties. There have been some issues with the Ellington site, as well as Ellington Field. The BCA has alerted the relevant officials about these issues, so we can hope for a speedier response in the future. Remember to contact Georgetown University officials (Cory.Peterson@georgetown.edu) if a student house has not complied with the law.

The first meeting of the **Ellington Community Partnership** occurred on February 11 with a construction committee meeting on February 27. Although work is progressing slowly at present, things will speed up very soon. Burleith is well

represented on both groups by community representatives Ed Ohl, Dan Herlihy, Lesli Mangeri, Nan Coughlin, Kay Twomey, and myself. The meetings are ably chaired by our ANC representative, Ed Solomon. We are making sure that the new designs are acceptable and are flagging future issues, such as the importance of a parking plan.

One of the first steps will be to study the impact of **construction vibrations** on adjacent properties. A team from the city will visit each affected home on R Street, as well as a couple of homes on 35th and 36th Streets. Details will be forthcoming. I should also mention that the decision to locate the **parking garage entrance** on 36th Street is not completely finalized. A meeting of the Public Space Committee sometime in the spring will afford the BCA one last chance to represent our position. I think that the likelihood is quite low that Reservoir Road will be chosen, but the opportunity to formally voice our position is welcome.

This is the last hard copy issue of the *Burleith Bell* until early June. The BCA Board has tentatively decided to move to 4 issues per year (March, June, October, and December), from the old schedule of

10 issues annually. In the meantime, we hope that the new website (going live in the immediate future) will not just compensate for the reduction in issues, but will provide a variety of additional features and venues for community building.

There are various and sundry issues that the BCA is following. There may be slight changes to **bus routes**. For the D1, the plan is to eliminate the segment between Franklin Square and Federal Triangle and for the D2 to reduce Saturday, Sunday, and weekday peak and midday frequency of buses. There might also be an extension of the Circulator route up to the Cathedral. The BCA is looking into co-sponsoring (with Hillandale) a **community shred** event in the next few months. Details will follow. Finally, there may be some movement on the planned sale and/or redevelopment of the **Fillmore School** site. We will do whatever we can to ensure that the Tot Lot remains where it is. We will share information when we know more.



As members of the Burleith History Group, we are working with Arcadia Publishing to produce a book on Burleith as part of its *Images of America* series. Arcadia, the leading publisher of local and regional pictorial histories, recognizes the historical significance of Burleith and believes this book will be an excellent addition to its series. The book will weave over 200 captioned images into a 128-page pictorial history of our neighborhood.

We are working with the Georgetown Library Peabody Room, the George Washington University Gelman Library (Burleith Archives), the Historical Society of Washington, the Library of Congress, and other sources, but we need the help of Burleith's current and former residents to round out the image collection. We are especially interested in everyday images of people, streets, houses, cars, and Burleith activities.

The most sought-after images are those from the "early" days of Burleith, although Arcadia allows ten percent of the images to date from the 1970s or later, what it calls "modern." We have already received contributions from a number of current and former residents and would like to give special thanks to Myles Johnson, Jeffery King, Susan Lockwood, Mary Ann MacKenzie, Neva Van Peski, Edgar Farr Russell III, Mara Viksnins, and Charles and Jutta Volkman for allowing us to digitally scan their slides and photographs to Arcadia's strict specifications. Pat Scolaro has also been actively soliciting former Burleith residents for their images.

Restaurant Review: Bistroquet

For decades, Listrani's on MacArthur Boulevard in the Palisades was a popular neighborhood meeting place. Quite suddenly, it closed. Last September, Benoit Grenier, the owner of Bistro d'Oc downtown on 10th Street, replaced Listrani's with Bistroquet, an informal French restaurant. Bernard Grenier, Benoit's father, is the chef. The Thai accents on several dishes are due to the chef's wife who comes from Thailand.

Bistroquet—which means little bistro—is an attractive restaurant, divided into two rooms, with the bar in the front room. White table cloths on well-spaced tables are covered with white butcher paper. The atmosphere is casual, the food is good, the service friendly, and conversation is easy.

Two of the restaurant's signature dishes are a half roast chicken and a steak with "frites." The chicken is delicious—crisp skin, tender meat redolent of herbs. It is served with French fried potatoes and creamed spinach, both excellent. The fries are particularly appealing—hot and crisp, served without ketchup. The chicken comes with a little pot of aioli sauce, which goes well with both the chicken and the potatoes. The hanger steak, accompanied similarly with the French fries and creamed spinach, is tender and cooked as ordered. The blue cheese sauce served with the steak, however, is disappointingly watery.

The regular menu, together with a carte du jour (daily menu), offers a wide range of dishes. At a recent dinner, for example, the daily menu included a duck flan and a sauté of Brussels sprouts with bits of bacon as appetizers. The flan was grainy, not silky smooth as a flan should be. The lobster sauce on which it was served was fine. The sprouts, tasty as they were, are really a side dish rather than an appetizer. Happily, Bistroquet serves a variety of offal specialties: lamb brains, liver, tripe, kidneys. They are not all always available, but it is a pleasure to see them back on a French menu. Other first courses are smoked trout, snails, pate, onion soup, and a large hors d'oeuvres plate. Among the main courses are chicken and shrimp curries, cassoulet, a sirloin pepper steak, a number of fish preparations, and Thai rice dishes.

The lunch menu offers sandwiches and salads in addition to several of the dinner dishes at somewhat reduced prices. There is also an interesting carry-out menu, which includes pizzas, sandwiches, Thai fried rice, beef bourguignon, and a veal blanquette.

Just because you don't have a fireplace, it doesn't mean you don't have a chimney!

If you have a gas furnace (which many Burleith homes do), chances are you have a chimney to vent out the combustible gasses. Over the past few years, I've found that many of our Burleith homes have crumbling chimney tops and cracked flues. Some of this is due to age and, surprisingly, the 2012 earthquake.

It is extremely important to have your chimney inspected to ensure that you don't have any issues with water and carbon monoxide leaking. Both can have a devastating impact on the structural soundness of your home as well as your safety.

Finding a reputable chimney repair service is just as important. Make sure the company is associated with the National Chimney Sweep Guild (NCSG) and is staying current with certifications from, for example, the Chimney Safety Institute of America (CSIA). Their websites have a search directory to help you find local repair people.

Tap Tip from DC Water

From March 23 through May 4, the Washington Aqueduct will temporarily switch the disinfectant used for drinking water treatment from chloramine to chlorine. During this time, you may notice a slight change in the taste and smell of your drinking water. To minimize a chlorine taste or odor, flush cold water taps for two minutes, refrigerate cold tap water, or use a water filter.

2. Date, time, and address (to the best of your knowledge) of the disturbance.
3. Description of the noise or other problem.
4. The action you took and when (such as called the GU Helpline).
5. The result of that action, if any.
