President's Message



I hope everyone had a great summer that included relaxing and fun vacation time.

As you'll see by the cover, our June picnic helped launch the

summer scene in our neighborhood and continued the celebration of Burleith's 90th birthday. I applaud Kay Twomey and her talented volunteers for putting together such a successful event!

Greetings to Georgetown University (GU) students, new and returning. We in Burleith look forward to getting to know you and to working with you to ensure an excellent quality of life in the community for us all. We are pleased about our recent work with GU to address serious student-related problems and believe that the positive steps already taken and those proposed will continue through the efforts of the Georgetown Community Partnership (GCP). We seek your cooperation to sustain and advance these improvements.

Congratulations to **Cory Peterson** on his new job as director of GU's new **Office on Neighborhood Life**. We anticipate a positive and ongoing collaboration with him and his colleagues on key GU and community issues, including noise, safety, and enforcement of tenant rights for students.

I want to underscore Cory's recommendation to call the **GU Helpline** at (202) 687-8413 to report problems in the neighborhood. GU staffs this line 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and has committed to following up on 100 percent of all calls. (Please continue to email bca@burleith.org regarding noise problems). As Cory notes, the **Student Neighborhood Assistance Program** (SNAP) patrols the neighborhood and responds to disturbances on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights from 10 pm to 3 am and will answer calls at these times. (See Cory's article on page 3.)

Beginning in 2011, the BCA Board initiated discussions about **updating our 2006 bylaws** and ensuring their compliance with the District of Columbia Nonprofit Corporation Act of 2010. These initial conversations were interrupted by the GU campus plan process and then re-started recently with a small committee made up of Lenore Rubino, Kay Twomey, and Linda Brooks. Given the complexity of the issues, the board also hired a lawyer with expertise in civic associations to help guide us. Last month, a majority of the board approved the updated bylaws. The process for approval of membership-related sections includes a vote by BCA members; other sections can simply be approved by the board. We'll send BCA members a summary of the new bylaws and pertinent changes soon in preparation for an anticipated

vote at the annual meeting in November. At that time, we will also present a slate of proposed 2014 board officers and members for BCA member consideration.

The city has selected an architect for the **renovation of Duke Ellington School of the Arts**. Last month, a committee made up of DC officials, ANC2E members, representatives of community civic associations, and architects met to discuss the next steps. Kay Twomey is representing BCA at these planning meetings. I hope Burleith residents will attend the upcoming community meeting, which you'll hear more about via the listserv as soon as we have more details.

The BCA Board is concerned about **DDOT's proposed Visitor Parking Plan (VPP) policy**. Accordingly, we have sent a statement to DDOT asking it to defer the one-placard system until the agency and we can consider a more flexible and effectively enforceable arrangement. More information on this issue is available in the archived August 14 edition of the *Georgetown Current* available at www.currentnewspapers.com. Please send your comments about this proposed policy to publicspace.policy@dc.gov.

As we head into fall, I hope to see you outside enjoying the beauty of the change of seasons in our neighborhood.

GU Opens New Office of Neighborhood Life

Georgetown University's new Office of Neighborhood Life was established to work with our neighbors to improve the quality of life in Burleith, West Georgetown, and Foxhall. To assist neighbors, my professional staff consists of an associate director, two community directors for Burleith and West Georgetown, and a new coordinator of off-campus housing. My staff is also a resource for students living in the community, educating them about their responsibilities and providing any support they may need.

We will follow up with you by phone, email, or in person about issues that you report through GU's Helpline at (202) 687-8413. A one-stop shop for reporting issues, such as noise, trash, safety, or parking, the Helpline is staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and should be called to report any neighborhood concerns related to the university. The university can best help you and all of our neighbors if you call the Helpline first and provide as much information as

possible so that we can properly address the situation. My office has committed to following up on 100 percent of calls that come to the Helpline, a commitment that stems from our engagement with the Georgetown Community Partnership (GCP).

My office also runs the Student Neighborhood Assistance Program (SNAP). SNAP cars proactively patrol our neighborhood for safety purposes and to respond to disturbances on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights from 10 pm–3 am during the fall and spring semesters. SNAP will answer the Helpline when staff is on duty; GU Police Department communications officers will answer the Helpline all other times.

We also have a close working relationship with the Office of Student Conduct. The university has hired a new associate director of student conduct who is specifically responsible for handling off-campus conduct cases. This is another commitment that resulted from our GCP work.

Calling the Helpline to report any concerns and reaching out to my office to discuss more substantive issues are the best ways to use our resources and strengthen the partnership between the community and Georgetown University.

One-Year Summary of Noise Statistics



BCA collected statistics on noise occurrences from September 2012 through August 2013. Emails to bca@burleith.org documented 73 noise events during the year and cited 36 row houses for excessive noise. Over 80 percent of the disturbances occurred between Friday night and Sunday evening. BCA uses this information to work collaboratively with GU's Office of Neighborhood Life to ensure a quiet neighborhood.

Safeway. Many of you have Safeway cards, and probably know that you can register your card with eScrip so that each time you shop, a small donation (at no cost to you) is made to a school or community group of your choice. If you have not chosen a recipient for your eScrip funds, the Hardy Middle School PTA would love your support. Here's how:

- Go www.eScrip.com, and click on "Sign Up."
- Enter the Hardy Middle School ID (2479580) as the "Group ID."
- Register your Safeway card number.*
- Shop at Safeway!

Amazon.com. Hardy is a member of the Amazon affiliates program. If you go the Hardy website (www.harddms.org) and scroll down, you'll see a link to Amazon.com on the right side. Each time you shop at Amazon, enter the website through that link. Amazon will donate 6 percent of the value of what you purchase to the Hardy PTO!

Target. Target's Give With Target campaign has the potential of raising up to \$10,000 for Hardy this year. All it requires is a Facebook account and about a minute of your time to vote each week through September 21, when the program ends (or until the full \$5 million has been allocated). Once a school receives 25 votes, Target will donate \$1 per vote, with a maximum donation of \$10,000 per school. Here's how:

- Go to your Facebook page, search for "Give With Target," search for Rose L. Hardy Middle School, and vote once a week.
- Share the news with friends, family, and other community members.

Georgetown Village Offers New Membership Category

It was a busy and productive summer for Georgetown Village—a large number of services were requested and fulfilled for vacationing and stay-at-home members, new volunteers were trained, members participated in trips and gatherings, and plans and goals were established for the coming year.

The village celebrates its second anniversary in December and continues to evolve. We've increased the number and variety of member programs and added three new members to the Board of Directors: Thomas L. Birch, Rev. John M. Graham, and Gloria Weissberg. Most importantly, the board is pleased to announce a new membership category it has long been eager to offer and, based on the current sound financial status of the village, can now do.

Although we live in an affluent neighborhood, many cannot afford the annual village dues of \$900 for households and \$600 for individuals. Since some of these people would benefit from and enjoy village membership, the board is delighted to offer a limited number of **subsidized memberships** to individuals and households in the Georgetown village service area who find the current fee structure beyond their financial comfort zone.

After researching how other villages handle this issue, we adopted the same standard that Capitol Hill Village uses for its program. We've established maximum income levels that qualify people for subsidized annual membership dues of \$150 (household) and \$100 (individual). If you or someone you know might be able to take advantage of this membership category, executive director Lynn Golub-Rofrano can

provide more information and can be reached at (202) 999-8988 or lynn@georgetown-village.org. (Be assured that the names of participants in the subsidized membership program are treated as highly confidential and are shared only with the village executive director and treasurer.)

On another note, keep your eyes open for an announcement of another new membership category that should appeal to many existing and new members.

The board has given careful thought to implementing each of these new membership categories. Because the dues for regular memberships do not cover the cost of operations, the village depends upon donations to cover the shortfall. To kick off its fall fundraising effort, the village will host a very festive event in October. Look for your invitation soon. If you're not a member but may be interested in attending, please get in touch with Lynn. This will be a party that you won't want to miss!

On Thursday, September 19, from 6:30–7:30 pm, village founder Sharon Lockwood, president Jessica Townsend, and executive director Lynn Golub-Rofrano will discuss the village concept with Burleith residents and answer questions. My Early Life in Burleith

My parents, Wynne and Iris B. Johnson, were not among the first residents of the new Burleith development, but they were the first purchasers of the little rowhouse at 3829 S Street, overlooking a sloping field that would become the Western High School stadium. When they bought it and moved here in 1927, they were a youngish couple, in their 30s, artists, who had met at the Corcoran School, married in 1924, with a son born in 1925. They were still struggling to establish careers. My father's career as a portrait painter had never started and he had returned to earlier training as a draftsman to try building a business in patent drawing; my mother was getting some work as a commercial artist for downtown stores.

I was born in 1929 so my earliest "memories" are the stories my mother told me about my fascination with the steam shovel that, in 1931, began digging into that field across the street to cut out a level field for the stadium. Anytime I could escape I would be found there watching the trucks and shovel at work. Our block, at the end of S Street, was one of the last to be built up. It ended at 39th Street, which ran along the edge of the Archbold estate and its woods that extended down to the creek. The streets then looked bare, with spindly young trees in frame boxes. There was a mailbox every block or two, often next to a fire alarm box. In the evening, after dinner, kids would gather at the corner to talk and play. Cars were few, so one could play games in the street with little problem.

My first world was that block between 38th where the O'Connells (parents of my first heartthrob, Mary Ellen) lived on the corner and the Horsfalls on 39th. Mr. Horsfall was a noted painter of wildlife and nature, who painted background scenes for the National Zoo. But as soon as I started at Fillmore Elementary, I entered a new world. By that time, too, I was old enough to go with my brother, Humphrey, into the wilderness of the Archbold's and down to the creek, which became my favorite playground for many years. We would go up to the end of 39th and onto the field there that we knew as the "Daisy Field" (to distinguish it from the

"Green Field" down by 37th). Then to the left down the hill outside of the Archbold's to the creek and up or down it. When we first began messing around in the creek, there were crayfish, or some form of crayfish, to be found there.

There were other directions to go in exploring. The empty field across Reservoir Road (where the GU hospital is now) led to the deep valley beside the GU campus. A paved road about halfway down was used by GU priests for meditative strolls, and at the bottom sat the GU swimming pool. The pool was surrounded by a chain fence, but since when was that any obstacle to young boys? When girls entered our life, it became even more popular.

Hallowe'en—that's how it was spelled then—was more tricks than treats. After dark, metal trash cans would be rolled down the alley. Cars would get soaped windows. I recall even seeing the famed "dog poop in a paper bag set on fire before ringing a front door bell" gambit. The next morning toilet paper was hanging from various odd places.

Today 39th Street is a clean, trimmed, well-lit road. Before Hillandale, however, it was more like a country backroad. No sidewalk, no streetlights, dark, and private—a readymade lover's lane. It was not unknown for parked cars to have a couple of dastardly boys pop up and peek in, sending one or both the parties inside to the floor or under a blanket. But tragedies played out there, as well. One lazy afternoon I was exploring the overgrown Archbold side of 39th where people discarded things. I came across a lidded pot and took off the lid, exposing an oddity. It looked at first like some chicken thighs floating in a dark soup but then I realized I was looking at a little baby, floating in a bloody mix. I ran home and told my mother, who called it in to the police. I didn't spend much time on 39th Street after that.

Sports were never my big interest, but we did have a neighborhood football team for several years—the Burleith Panthers or Bulldogs—on which I was charitably allowed to play a hapless guard. We played

teams from nearby areas of Georgetown, who were somewhat rougher in style, as I remember it. The core group that I hung around with consisted of Dick Taylor, Eddie Silvester, Randy Watson, Bunky and Chuck Molster, but others were "Buddha" Beard, Reese Stephens, and Walter Combs.

Some folks can recall their elementary years in detail but not me. I do remember the graham crackers and butter with milk (which I still enjoy), being told by my first-grade teacher that putting a porch on the house I drew was somehow "wrong," and my acting debut as Tiny Tim in *The Christmas Carol*.

I began to wake up in junior high, at Gordon. It was a rude awakening. On Sunday, December 7, 1941, while listening to a Redskins game, we first learned of the attack on Pearl Harbor. The next day in school, in my 7th grade home room, we heard FDR's "Day of Infamy" speech. It was the end of my early years. Soon Randy and I were spending evenings going over to Foxhall to sit on the church back steps and "visit" with his girl, Sally, and her friend Suzy, whom Sally had persuaded to keep me occupied.

By 1940 my father had found his niche as art director for the Department of Agriculture's publications, and my mother's career as an illustrator of children's books was underway. My brother would soon be drafted. I discovered jazz (as a fan, not a musician) and entered a whole new world where I still reside a good part of the time.

Life changed.

RESTAURANT REVIEW: RIPPLE

Ripple is a relative newcomer in the strip of restaurants on Connecticut Avenue between Macomb and Ordway Streets in Cleveland Park. The restaurant has just celebrated its third birthday with a new chef, Marjorie Meek-Bradley, who has lots of original ideas. She produces some fine dishes made with local produce. Her menu varies from day to day, depending on what's available at the market. Fish is always well represented.

The summer soup is a creamy corn soup served over a spoonful of tiny potato cubes and a few smoked mussels. The soup is rich without being heavy and would be just as delicious without the addition of the small mussels.

Salads include Bibb lettuce with a sprinkling of cucumbers, radishes, and blue cheese in a light buttermilk dressing. A salad of mixed greens tossed with blueberries, hazelnuts, and goat cheese is equally refreshing.

Lovely house-made spinach tortellini are dressed with a light sauce of mushrooms and pine nuts. The almost transparent tortellini are delicate and subtle. Perfect potato gnocchi are sauced with a tomato and merguez sausage ragu.

A main course of roast pork loin is served slightly pink. The meat is not fork tender, but juicy and perfectly cooked. Rabbit is a current specialty: the chef's rabbit sausage is mild and very good; the rabbit liver pate is stronger in flavor. The dish is coupled with baby turnips and some delicious red cabbage.

Other main courses are a summer vegetable cassoulet of tomato confit and zucchini; pan roasted scallops served with andouille sausage and potato puree; and dukkah (a mix of Mediterranean spices) crusted tile fish with eggplant and roasted tomatoes.

Some of the sides make good starters: creamy polenta with a hint of Parmesan cheese is excellent. And if Chef Meek-Bradley's prosciutto arancini are on the menu, be sure to order them. These round balls of rice with a bit of chopped prosciutto and cheese in the middle are fried and served on a bed of tomato sauce, topped with a little grated Parmesan.

A dessert not to be missed is the butterscotch pudding with crunchy toffee bits on top. It's smooth, creamy, and luscious. Tiny pink macaroons and cubes of fruit jelly are gifts at the end of the meal.


The wine and beer lists are interesting and unusual. Many of the wines come from relatively unknown vineyards from all over the world.

Don't be put off by the noisy bar running the length of the front room with tiny tables for two along the wall. There's a small room in the back and a larger one to the side where one can talk without shouting. Both are attractive, friendly places for enjoying Chef Marjorie's good food at leisure.
