

President's Message



Almost a year has passed since our last BCA community meeting. Following that November 2013 gathering, many of you commented that the meeting agenda was too full and that more time for discussion was needed. We paid attention and hope that you will join us for this year's **BCA annual meeting** on Thursday, November 13, at 6:30 pm at the Washington International School to enjoy the changes. We'll post the agenda on the website later this month and in the November *Burleith Bell*.

Members of the BCA with voting privileges (i.e., resident households and non-resident owners), whose dues are up-to-date, will be able to vote at the meeting for the slate of **BCA board officers and at-large directors** (see pages 3-4). I urge non-members to consider joining (and lapsed members to renew) so they can also make their voices heard. In addition, membership dues help the BCA provide the advocacy (e.g., Ellington School renovation) and activities (seasonal parties, Burleith listserv, website, and special interest groups, to name a few) that residents benefit from and enjoy.

My thanks to **nominating committee** members Rich Field, Edie Cecil, and Eric Langenbacher for preparing the slate. As required by the BCA bylaws, they submitted the candidates to me on September 15, and

I in turn submitted them to the Board for approval, which was granted.

ANC 2E commissioner Ed Solomon has advised us of the following: **AT&T's temporary cell tower** will be operational the first week of October, but there is no word from Sprint and T-Mobile; the **Circulator bus stop** on 35th Street will be restored after minor infrastructure changes; **two-way traffic on 35th Street** is permissible between Whitehaven Parkway and Wisconsin Avenue; our **new voting precinct** will be at the Georgetown Library due to Duke Ellington School's renovation; and **DDOT is reviewing the timing of lights** at 35th and Wisconsin and at Wisconsin and Whitehaven.

Ed also has informed me that a second meeting of the **Duke Ellington construction management committee** took place on September 25. Some news from that meeting: interior demolition will take place over the next month and a half; demolition of the rear building will begin in a month or so; workers will park off site and be bused to the work site; and a schedule of the construction work is forthcoming. Complaints should go to our committee representatives (see box), and a log will be kept to ensure that all concerns receive a response within 24 hours.

It is time once again for the annual **BCA Halloween party** at the Tot Lot! Kay and Eric Langenbacher are preparing a fun-filled event for Burleith children on Sunday,

October 26, from 2-4 pm. See the cover for details and how you can participate.

And please help us **clean up Burleith** on Saturday, November 1. As always, organizer Janice Sims brings outstanding energy to this effort that contributes to the ongoing beautification of our neighborhood. We'd like to see some new faces, too. See page 5 for the specifics.

I look forward to seeing you all at all these BCA activities! Enjoy the beautiful fall weather.

Proposed Slate for 2015

Officers

President: Eric Langenbacher. Eric and his wife, Kayoko (Kay), have lived on T Street since 1997, a year after they moved to Washington. They have two boys, Adam (16), who attends St. Albans School, and Max (12), who is at Washington Latin Public Charter School. Eric is the director of the Honors Program and a visiting assistant professor in the Department of Government, Georgetown University. He studied German and political science in Canada before completing his PhD in government at Georgetown in 2002. Besides driving his kids around, he spends his free time cycling and gardening.

Vice President: Nan Bell. Before becoming president of the BCA, Nan served as vice-president and treasurer of the association. As president, Nan sits on the Georgetown Community Partnership (GCP) steering committee and works closely with the five GCP working groups that have Burleith representation. Most of Nan's professional career has been in the field of international educational and professional exchange at the U.S. Department of State, where she managed a budget of over \$70 million and a professional staff of 100 exchange officers. She holds an MA in French literature from George Washington University, a BA in French from Rhodes College in Memphis, and a certificate in executive international business from Georgetown University. Nan travels to France with her partner, Robert Kane, whenever possible and has lived in Burleith since the late 1970s.

Co-Recording Secretary: Alex Frederick. Alex is a retired teacher who has lived in Burleith for the past 4 years with his wife, Katherine Schantz, head of the Lab Schools of Washington and Baltimore. For 20 years Alex worked extensively for the Kildonan School in Amenia, NY, and the Wheeler School in Providence, RI, teaching both English and photography and coaching high school and middle school lacrosse. Before moving to the District, he was a member of the sales staff for Philadelphia's leading professional photography store, The Camera Shop, in Bryn Mawr. Alex currently represents Burleith on the GCP transportation and parking working group. He is a graduate of Penn State University and has a master's degree in film from Boston University. His photography work has appeared at the Waverly Street Gallery in Bethesda and in Photographer Forum's book *Best of Photography 2010*. Along with supporting his wife, Alex spends his free time pursuing his interest in photography, concentrating mostly on family portraits, small weddings, and fine-art printing.

Co-Recording Secretary (incoming): Robert Russell. Robert and his wife, Emily, moved to Burleith in 2004 (which makes it the longest he's lived in one place), a year after moving to DC from Manhattan. Heidi, their dog, was the first addition to the family soon after buying the home. They now have two daughters: Annika (6), who attends Stoddert Elementary, and Ingrid (3), who looks forward to doing the same next year. Robert, who grew up mostly in Europe and

graduated from Colgate University, works for SRA International serving the federal government as a consultant on national security and emergency preparedness issues. He coaches Annika's soccer team, is an avid skier and loves winter weather, and looks forward to continuing to support the great community of Burleith.

Corresponding Secretary: Linda Brooks. Originally from Southern California, Linda moved to Burleith in 1983 for a job promotion and has lived here ever since. She holds a master's degree in mathematics and worked in software development, metrics, cost estimation, and process improvement for many years before retiring from Northrop Grumman a few years ago and becoming active in the community. In 2009 she set up Burleith's online membership database and joined the Board in 2012 as corresponding secretary with responsibility for membership. In 2013 BCA membership increased over 20%. A passionate lover of the outdoors, she has gone on extended backpacking trips in California, Colorado, New Zealand, and Peru. Her other life-long interest is Scandinavian folk dancing. Co-founder and director of the "Scandia DC" dance group, she teaches and performs Scandinavian folk dance at various venues. Linda and her husband, Ross Schipper, spearheaded the startup of the now-popular Burleith Special Interest Groups (BSIGs) and host the Winter Gløgg Party. She also represents Burleith on the GCP metrics and data working group.

Composed of a physician, geriatrician, physical therapist, nurse, and nurse practitioner specializing in gerontology, HCAC plays a role in one of the most important aspects of aging: keeping us as healthy as possible.

Last year’s lecture series, which was open to the public, enlightened members about important health care issues. Gardening in Burleigh

Our lives today have become so full and frenzied. I sometimes find it is hard to deal with anything that doesn't have to be done right NOW. Correspondingly, with many things competing for center stage, our attention spans shorten. If I don't get to the point soon, for example, many of you will move on to the next article.

A garden requires the absolute opposite state of mind: the ability to plan ahead and see far into the future. It sure would be great to harvest a big bunch of basil and make pesto tonight, but did you plant your basil plant last spring and tend it through the summer? If you want to have a gorgeous, tall crape myrtle blooming right outside your second-floor bedroom window, that vision may take years or decades to achieve. Conversely, you might find a cute little shrub at the nursery that looks just great in front of another plant. But give it a few years and your cute shrub may grow to obscure, indeed overtake, everything behind it. Did you check the label closely to find a cultivar which will grow very, very slowly? Gardening trains us to slow down, to become patient, to look far into the future. It teaches us to move at what is actually the speed of life. Thus, it's an antidote for those aspects of modern life which are kind of toxic.

Right now these thoughts are relevant because it is the time to look ahead to spring. When you're waking up to the first warm day after the onslaught of (possible) winter snow and ice, it will be too late to decide that you just have to see crocuses in February, daffodils in March, or tulips in April. Now is the time, folks, to buy your bulbs.

Put them in a few weeks down the road, when the weather is a little colder and squirrels aren't quite so enthusiastic about digging for nuts. Look back in the *Burleigh Bell* archives for my October 2012 column with specific information on where to buy, what to buy, and how to plant bulbs. This year's column is more about ... well, shall we call it the psychology of gardening?

Because, you know, even those of us who never get our hands in the soil or put in a plant are going to have to develop a gardener's mind. We are all hung up in the necessities of the moment, which admittedly can be overwhelming, and we aren't taking time to see the very big elephant in the room. I was blown away to read a recent *New York Times*/CBS News poll (<http://nyti.ms/1rhFEj0>) stating that only 1% of those surveyed listed the environment as a top concern for the United States. Though 54% thought that climate change is caused by human behavior, 57% didn't think it would cause any harm to them personally.

We all need to wake up and smell the coffee, look down the road a few years, and realize that this is a high-priority item. If we keep going along with business as usual, we're going to find our world is no longer livable, not in some distant future but in our own lifetimes. I know you didn't pick up the *Burleigh Bell* to read this, but where better to talk about plants and critters than a gardening column? So give it some thought, and find even a small thing you can do to take some action, personally or politically, okay?
