Face-Off: Burleith Residents Vie for ANC Commissioner Job

Editor's Note: With input from the BCA Board, The Burleith Bell asked Ed Solomon and Kishan Putta to respond to the same five questions with concise answers. Their responses are unedited.



WHY ARE YOU RUNNING FOR THIS POSITION?



I have represented Burleith as the BCA President, Chair of ANC2E and ANC Commissioner. I have a close working relationship with the City Council, Mayor's Office and City Agencies. Maintaining the quality of life in Burleith is the reason I am seeking re-election for ANC Commissioner. There are some key decisions that

will need to be voted on in the coming months and over the next year - DC Fair Skies Coalition (of which I am President), Visitors parking passes, addressing the impact of on-street parking from Duke Ellington School events. Many folks in the community reached out to encourage me to run for another term. We still have a lot of work left to do as far as lobbying on behalf of the community interest and many feel that I am the best positioned with my institutional knowledge and experience to continue to represent the voice of Burleith and Hillandale.



From the day my family moved here (39th & T), we've been warmly embraced by this community; this is our chance to give back.

I have over six years of experience serving the residents of DC—working for DC government (DC Health Link) and as an elected ANC Commissioner (in Dupont Circle). I work hard and have gotten a lot done—working

with neighbors and government.

Now that the rain has stopped—it has been one of the wettest years on record—it is time to enjoy fall. It has certainly been a busy season thus far. On September

5, the BCA published the results of our **survey on historic designation**, which was open to responses for two months. Of the 343 people who participated, 76% were against and 24% were for historic designation. In light of this clear result, the BCA Board believes that the matter is decided and that no further action is warranted by the BCA. We also informed the National Trust for Historic Preservation that we would not accept the grant money for community outreach that they awarded in summer 2016. I would like to thank all the individuals who have helped inform the discussion and gather the information we put together over two-and-a-half years of discussion.

Please mark your calendars for the **BCA Annual Meeting** on Thursday, November 8 from 7:00-9:15 PM at the Duke Ellington School of the Arts. On the agenda will be voting for the proposed 2019 slate of the Board of Directors, a review of BCA activities over the last year, and presentation of the proposed budget for next year. As in previous years, there will be presentations from community leaders, such as Jack Evans (Ward 2 Councilmember), Ed Solomon (ANC 2E 01 representative), and Mayor Muriel Bowser, as well as from Georgetown University and MedStar Georgetown University Hospital. We will focus especially on the police report—in light of recent concerns about crime—and

a presentation from the District's official in charge of rodent control and abatement.

Three other events coming up include the **Halloween party** on Sunday, October 28 from 2:00-4:00 PM at the Tot Lot (weather permitting). This event is geared towards younger children and will involve games, snacks, prizes and, of course, costumes. On Saturday, November 3rd our semi-annual **community clean-up** will take place. We always meet bright and early at the entrance to Ellington Field and then fan out across the neighborhood. **Election Day** is November 6 and our polling place is located at the Duke Ellington School of the Arts. Also, on November 6 at 10:30 AM, Georgetown University has scheduled a private, curated tour for 25 Burleith residents of the newly opened **Maria and Alberto de la Cruz Gallery** at the corner of Prospect and 36th Streets. More details on all these events will be sent via email.

On September 13, ANC 2E and other stakeholders hosted a town hall on **small cell facilities**. In order to improve reception for current users and, more importantly, to prepare for 5G technology, various companies plan to install small, wireless communication facilities on poles throughout the District including ANC2E. Most of the planned poles will be in Georgetown, but there will be some in Burleith, especially around Duke Ellington and Hardy Middle School. Residents have raised concerns about the number of poles, locations, aesthetics, and health issues. At its October 1 meeting, ANC 2E passed a resolution asking for clearer procedures to address such concerns in our neighborhoods, but the District government and FCC are also involved. My two issues are that some folks in Georgetown want

separate poles for this infrastructure, instead of piggy-backing on existing light poles, as well as the fact that each company wants to have their own, proprietary poles. I think the least the city could do is to require the firms to coordinate to minimize the impact. Work on **green infrastructure** in several Burleith alleys is scheduled to start on or around October 22 and be completed by March 2019. Officials will be notifying affected residents in a variety of ways. We will also share detailed information as it becomes available. On the issue of water, I have been asked to serve on **DC Water's Stakeholder Alliance**. This group will discuss the various infrastructure initiatives and the fees associated with these projects. If you have concerns about anything water related, please do not hesitate to contact me at: president@burleith.org.

Construction at **MedStar hospital** is intensifying. There will be shifting traffic patterns around the expanded construction and staging areas. This will affect neighbors accessing the hospital complex, as well as the Leavey Center and other places on campus. We will continue to monitor traffic problems on Reservoir Road and look for remedies if needed. Certainly, the MedStar representatives should respond to community concerns at the annual meeting.

There have been some recent car and garage break-ins and thefts. Although the police and the university have added additional patrols,

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remember to always lock your car doors, back doors, and garages. If you see anything, please contact 911 immediately. I am intrigued by the DC program that Ed Solomon recently shared, which would subsidize the installation of **security cameras** especially in alleys. We are actively looking into this.

Parking is also once again a concern—particularly around Ellington School. We have asked for increased enforcement, but please let us know if you notice persistent issues with violators. I share many neighbors’ concerns about traffic, especially on 35th and 37th Streets. **Speeding and incomplete stopping** are out of control—I recently saw someone

around 11 PM roar up 35th Street without even slowing down at any intersection. We will press the police and DDOT to do something.

Pulling it Together: Ellington Celebrates New Season

The Duke Ellington School of the Arts is showcasing a brilliant and exciting arts series this fall. Ellington Arts! 2018—where students share their talents and professional skills during exhibitions and performances—promises to inspire and activate the school community, neighborhood, and all of Washington, D.C.

The season begins in October with “Pulling It Together,” an exhibition curated by the Museum Studies Department. The exhibit features artwork created by current and retired teachers throughout the DC Public School system. On October 20, the school hosts its annual fall fundraiser and community fun day, March for the Arts. In November and December, neighbors are invited to attend a variety of concerts and showcases presented by the Instrumental Music, Vocal Music and Theatre Departments. The calendar year wraps up on December 1, with a holiday bazaar and mini concert, part of the new public programming series @35th&R.

All proceeds from ticket sales go directly to support the sponsoring departments, and community attendance is another way to support the arts and gifted students who are responsible for the audience experience from costumes and production to technical design and performances.

Duke Ellington was established in 1974 by the legendary D.C. activist and avid art collector Peggy Cooper Cafritz and the late dancer and choreographer Mike Malone. They envisioned a new kind of learning experience, a place where the District’s youth would receive world-class arts training alongside rigorous academic instruction. In 2000, the natural public and private partnerships surrounding the school coalesced into the Duke Ellington School of the Arts Project (DESAP)—the project includes DCPS, The Ellington Fund, the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, and The George Washington University. Charles Barber, Esq., of GWU serves as

president of DESAP board of directors. Today, Ellington remains the sole D.C. public high school to offer a dual curriculum encompassing professional arts training and academic enrichment, in preparation for college, careers in the arts and future leadership.

Last year, all 118 Ellington seniors graduated and demonstrated overall growth in AP Examinations (5 percent) compared to District averages (3 percent), as well as 6 percent growth on the Math PARCC Exam and scored approximately 12% higher than the district average on the ELA PARCC Exam. In addition to these impressive scores, every single Visual Arts student passed the Studio Art AP Exam and 86 percent of Instrumental Music students passed the Music Theory AP Exam.

Last year was a big year for students and the building itself. Ellington returned home to Burleith, to a newly modernized building where every square foot represents state-of-the-art learning and creating spaces. There are a number of reasons to visit the historic building that houses DC’s creative soul. From banners, book talks, and documentaries, to oral histories and community forums, the school’s artist-citizens will forge artistic explorations around the school-wide theme Education is Freedom, Art is Power!

Forging even stronger connections to the community, Ellington has appointed Burleith’s own Kay Twomey to the DESAP board of directors. Kay is a member of the BCA board and president of the Burleith Community Fund. Charles Barber stated that, “The entire DESAP board is happy to have Kay as a new member.” As CEO, I am thrilled as I look forward to working with Kay.

Many know Burleith as "The Village in the City." This is the neighborhood my wife and I decided to raise our daughter in and with that decision we ended up creating over three decades of memories in this community. Some of our fondest memories: teaching Hope to ride her bike in the ally behind our house, attending the annual Burleith picnic (the dunk tank was always a hit!), taking the neighborhood kids to Jelleff Recreation Center, roller skating night, and creating lasting friendships with our neighbors who have become like family. Burleith's nickname is "The Village In The City." And since we agree with the African proverb "it takes a village to raise a child," we are so fortunate to raise our son among such smart, interesting neighbors.

I'm running to better serve our neighbors and to create more opportunities/resources to bring us together.

Our neighbors! We just had our first child in June at Georgetown Hospital—our precious son Om. Recently, we hosted the Burleith Dining Club at our home and they surprised us by bringing him several gifts and a lovely "Welcome To Burleith, Om!" cake (he really wanted to eat it too!). It warmed our hearts and reconfirmed what we love about Burleith.

It's a great place to raise a family - not just because of the other kids around, but because there are individuals and families of all ages here who are supportive and welcoming and caring.

WHAT IS THE ONE THING YOU MOST WANT TO CHANGE ABOUT THE NEIGHBORHOOD?

To be honest, I would not change much. Of course, we have to deal with issues such as crime, rodents, potholes, noise, etc. However, you will find these problems in most communities. I am working hard with the DC Fair Skies Coalition to help alleviate air pollution and noise coming from planes taking off and landing at DCA. Improve traffic congestion exiting Burleith in the AM. With more young children in neighborhood, reduce cut-through traffic and speeding on local streets. However, at the end of the day the most important thing I would change by example would be to look at yourself and ask how you would change yourself so your community can get the benefits, not the other way around.

When I speak with neighbors about our community, many say they wish we had more opportunities to come together and meet up and interact.

That is why I've been pushing the city to improve the Jelleff Recreation Center (next to Safeway). It has been owned by the city for about a decade but it is hasn't been changed much since the 1950s and needs to be upgraded so that it can fill our community's need for public indoor space for classes, cooking, sports, exercise, socializing, and much more.

We got the city to provide \$7 million to improve Jelleff, and I am helping to lead community efforts to collect your input and to get us as good a facility as possible. I've done this before—getting \$11 million for the great Stead Park project in Dupont Circle—and I will work hard to help do it again for our neighborhood.

WHAT GOALS DO YOU HAVE FOR BURLEITH OVER THE NEXT 10 YEARS? HOW DO YOU FIT INTO THOSE GOALS?

For the past 20 plus years I have worked to improve the quality of life in this community. As a member of the Steering Committee of the Georgetown Community Partnership, my goal is to maintain the existing policies while implementing new initiatives. We have significantly reduced noise complaints from group house in Burleith. There are still areas that need to be addressed. The renovation of Hyde-Addison is expected to be completed summer of 2019. Unless there are changes in school boundaries, the new school boundary for Burleith will be Hyde-Addison and not Stoddert. If your child attends Stoddert they can continue. During Hyde construction, Meyers School became the swing school. Some opted out because of the long commute and sent their children to other schools. My goal is to work with other local community leaders to increase community enrollment at Hyde.

Over the next decade, most of Burleith will celebrate its centennial! That's exciting and I would like to help guide our neighborhood into the future, while respecting our history.

I'd like to strengthen our neighborhood's ties with Duke Ellington School and the Halcyon Arts Lab (in the old Fillmore school) so that we can come together as a community to appreciate the local art and the artists of ages.

I want to help our own local Hardy Middle School become the best middle school in DC. The Chancellor of DC Public Schools chose me to serve on her "Parents Cabinet" and I am pushing for Hardy and all schools to get the resources they need as they grow and improve.

Most of all, I hope we all appreciate each other even as our city changes. I have lots of experience helping to work out differences calmly and respectfully.

GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT IN BURLEITH AFFECT RESIDENTS, INVESTORS, AND DEVELOPERS. WHAT ROLE WILL YOU PLAY AS OUR COMMISSIONER AND WITH ANC 2E REGARDING SPECIAL EXCEPTION AND VARIANCE REQUESTS TO THE BOARD OF ZONING ADJUSTMENT AND OFFICE OF ZONING?

This is a very sensitive subject. As your ANC Commissioner, I have supported and opposed both special exceptions and variance requests through resolutions. In zoning, there are tests that must be met to receive a special exception and variance. A variance is more restrictive than a special exception. I have to follow the rules of zoning while representing the community. We have young families moving in with different needs than longtime residents. They want more living space. My role is to foster communication between neighbors to reach consensus. My experience before the Zoning Board is that there is a trend for more density. Burleith is experiencing change with the proliferation of larger homes. How this growth is managed will be an important role for the next ANC Commissioner. I have heard from some residents that the zoning rules are confusing and should be simplified (even for lawyers!). I will ask the agencies to give plain language explanations of important issues.

I have heard from others who know the rules well that there are certain developers who are abusing the rules. I will push policymakers to enforce the rules and to be careful and responsible when granting exceptions.

I want to help our neighbors get their voices heard. I would meet/talk with all parties well in advance of ANC meetings to get each others' perspectives, address concerns, and revise plans accordingly.

I will hold monthly meetings or calls to discuss any issues. I did this as ANC in Dupont as well. I am reachable many ways including by phone at 202-320-0058. But I always try to meet face to face if possible — we are all nearby neighbors after all!

School Notes from Georgetown

As University students settle into the semester, the Office of Neighborhood Life highlights some of the ways our office supports our students and neighbors in our community.

- **Trash Collection:** In an effort to help our students keep the neighborhood clean, our office coordinated a move-in trash collection for our students. We partnered with the University Facilities team to collect excess cardboard, old furniture, and other trash that moving to a new place produces. Since August, the University has completed almost 50 pick-up requests to properties rented by students throughout the Georgetown, Burleith and Foxhall neighborhoods
- **Know the Rules:** Our office also educates our students around city laws as well as university and community expectations. Each of our undergraduate students attends a mandatory off-campus living orientation session as school starts. When students attend our off-campus orientation, they are also given a copy of our Hoya Living Guide.
- **Weekly Email:** Georgetown University's Office of Community Engagement publishes a weekly email, Georgetown Neighborhood News, that shares information regarding University and community happenings for our local community.
- **24/7 Helpline:** The University operates a 24/7 Helpline to report any quality of life or student related concerns. Calling the Helpline allows the University to respond in real time, address any issues and create a report for follow up. The University Helpline number is (202) 687-8413.

- **BRiDGE the Gap:** We hope that if you are a student or are a permanent resident with a neighboring student property, you have taken some time to get to know your new neighbor. In an effort to help facilitate that meeting, our office coordinates monthly BRiDGE dinners in the neighborhoods nearest campus. BRiDGE dinners are a great opportunity for our students to meet the incredible permanent residents in our neighborhoods, and to foster community between student and non-student residents. BRiDGE dinners are typically 90-120 minutes, have 3-8 students in attendance and our office caters dinner from a restaurant of the host's choice. 2018 BCA Annual Meeting and Proposed Board Slate

The annual meeting of the Burleith Citizens Association will be held on Thursday, November 8, from 7:00–9:15 pm, likely at Duke Ellington School of the Arts. Watch the Burleith website for confirmation of location.

Per the BCA bylaws, BCA members who are Burleith residents or who own property in Burleith are entitled to vote. For voting purposes, membership must have been current 30 days before the vote (i.e., on October 9) and on the day of the vote (i.e., November 8). Resident-owner households have two votes, and other qualified voters have one vote. Procedures for additions to the proposed slate of officers and non-officer directors appear at the end of this post.

Since 1925, the BCA has been promoting the interests and advocating policies for Burleith residents and homeowners. As elected representatives, the Board provides a strong, unified voice to the community's concerns, communicates important and timely information, engages and advises governmental and other agencies, institutions, and neighboring civic associations on important issues. As the community grows and changes, the Board is tireless in its efforts and works with members and friends to ensure Burleith stays safe, strong, dynamic, engaged, and diverse.

PROPOSED BCA BOARD SLATE FOR 2018

President: Eric Langenbacher | Eric and his wife, Kayoko (Kay), have lived on T Street since 1997, a year after they moved to Washington. They have two boys, Adam (20), who attends the University of Colorado at Boulder, and Max (16), who is at School Without Walls. Eric is the director of the Honors Program and a teaching professor in the Department of Government, Georgetown University. He studied German and political science in Canada before completing his PhD in government at Georgetown in 2002. He spends his free time gardening.

Vice President: Nan Bell | Before becoming vice president of the BCA, Nan served as president and treasurer. 

Additions to the proposed slate of officers and non-officer directors may be made according to the current bylaws, which read: . . . any individual not nominated by the Nominating Committee, who is eligible for an officer or non-officer director position under the bylaws and wishes to be considered for such position by the membership at the Annual Meeting, shall be deemed nominated for such position if he or she submits a written petition signed by individuals representing no less than 30% of the voting membership of the Association, to the Corresponding Secretary of the Association no later than 14 days before the day of the Annual Meeting.



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But it's the food that is important. The menu lists four appetizers, four main courses, three salads and a half dozen or so pasta dishes. We began a recent dinner by splitting a dish of burrata with roasted red and yellow beets, some greens and a smattering of roasted hazelnuts, all bathed in a light vinaigrette. It was superb, a perfect combination of ingredients: the creamy delicate cheese, the flavorful beets, the crunch of the hazelnuts.

Fried artichokes are another tempting starter. Also on the menu is fried octopus with compressed watermelon, a fennel salad and potato chips. An arugula and radicchio salad with goat cheese is light and refreshing and makes a substantial first course.

Main courses include a New York strip steak, seared scallops and a whole fish. It's the house-made pasta dishes, however, that are irresistible. We opted for the agnolotti filled with a ragout of short ribs with a brown butter sage sauce. Lupo Verde's agnolotti are not the usual large, flat, round kind, but tiny, lumpy half moons. The filling was subtle, the sauce delicate.

The pasta choices include gemelli with Neapolitan ragu; spinach gnocchi with mushrooms, fava beans and sun-dried tomatoes; squid ink pasta with seafood; and ravioli filled with creamy garlic, parsley and chili peppers.

The restaurant's pastry chef makes a delicious hazelnut gelato, as well as several other desserts, including Italian doughnuts and panna cotta.

The wine list, which includes some nice whites and reds by the glass, is mostly Italian and on the expensive side, with only two bottles at the least expensive price of \$40.

There are Italian movies shown on the television screen above the bar on most nights. And in October, the restaurant will introduce its Italian nights when an Italian teacher will be teaching Italian during the dinner service.

The Osteria also features a lower level Italian market open from 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. The Alimentari market serves breakfast and lunch with dishes priced from \$3.50 to \$15. Customers can purchase house-made items and imported Italian products to go. Fresh and dried house-made pastas are available for purchase by the kilo, along with jams, olive oils, pastries, and sauces. A "Lazy Box" includes a nightly selection of house-made pasta and sauce for two to ten people, starting at \$25.

The Chef's Table in the Alimentari market accommodates 4 to 8 people for a seven-course plus dessert menu priced from \$120 to \$140 per person. Wine pairings are available for an additional cost.

Seasonal Changes Can Mean More Rat Activity— What can you do?

Take advantage of seasonal change. Make sure that rodents are controlled during winter and there will be fewer around to breed in the spring. This can help prevent a year of problems.

Store garbage in metal or heavy-duty plastic containers with tight-fitting lids. Keep kitchens clean and food stored in secure containers.

Keep yards clean so that rats and mice don't have the shelter and food necessary for breeding, and so that any young rodents seeking a new home won't easily move in. This includes cleaning up weeds, trash piles, garbage, and pet food.

Inspect buildings carefully, especially in the early fall. Make sure there are no holes or cracks for rats and mice to gain entrance. You can make rodent control work by reducing the food, water, and shelter that rodents need to thrive--and that's an important tip for every season of the year!
